



Day 1

- Nairobi – Arrival
- On arrival at JKI Airport, get your visa sorted with immigration and after that you will head to the baggage hall.
- A final clearance will be done by the Customs and do exit the building where our guide will be awaiting your arrival.
- After a brief introduction a transfer will be arranged to the hotel for leisure.
- Overnight at Hilton Garden Inn

Day 2

- Nairobi – Samburu
- Distance : 350kms
- Drive Time : 6.5hrs
- Breakfast will be served at 0630hrs.
- At 0700hrs depart for Samburu National Reserve.
- Enjoy a leisure and scenic drive as you pass fertile farm lands.
- Arrive at the lodge in time for lunch and leisure.
- At 1500hrs a visit will be arranged to a Samburu Village.

The Samburu tribe are a Nilotic tribe that inhabits Kenya's northern plains. They are a Maa-speaking group, and are very similar to the Maasai tribe.

Like Kenya's other pastoralist tribes, the Samburu people rear large herds of cows, sheep, goats and camels, which they openly graze on their communal land. Samburu herdsmen and their animals stay in one grazing area for as long as there is adequate pasture and water, then move on to new pastures once the current pasture has been exhausted.

Like the Maasai, the Samburu are nomadic pastoralists, moving from one place to another following patterns of rainfall in search of fresh pasture and water for their cattle, camels, goats and sheep.

The Samburu's are considered even more traditional and remote than their Maasai kin, and have maintained the authenticity of their culture by sticking to their ancient traditions and defying modern trends.

- Enjoy a brief game drive as you search for wildlife.
- Return back to the lodge for leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Sarova Shaba Lodge (B/L/D)

Day 3

- Samburu – Marsabit
- Distance : 286kms
- Drive Time : 5.5hrs
- Breakfast will be served at 0630hrs.
- At 0700hrs a check out will be arranged and depart for Marsabit National Park.
- Experience a leisurely drive arriving at the lodge in time for lunch and leisure.
- At 1500hrs explore the park that was once home to the Famous “Ahmed” The elephant with the longest Tusks to roam freely and was accorded 24hrs escort until his death.
- A visit will be arranged to Mount Marsabit where you will enjoy a refreshing view of Lake Paradise.
- Dinner and Overnight at Marsabit Lodge – Budget lodge (B/L/D)

Day 4

- Marsabit – Kalacha
- Distance : 185kms
- Drive Time : 4.5hrs
- Early breakfast will be served followed by a check out.
- A visit will be arranged to a Rendille Village.

Rendille Tribe

The Rendille people occupy the present day Marsabit County from Lake Turkana (Loyangalani) in the north to Merille River and Sereolipi the Merille River in the south from Marsabit town in the east to Lontolio and Ngurnit in the west. The main Rendille towns include Kargi, Korr, Laisamis, Merille, Karare, Kamboi and Marsabit town which as urbanite Centre.

The Rendille people of Kenya speak Rendille language. Rendille language is more close to Somali language which make it easy for people from the two tribes to communicate in their respective languages without misinterpretation. The intermarriages between the Samburu (tribe in their south and west) and the Rendille have led to growth of a new Rendille people who can speak Samburu. They are called Arielle Rendille. Most of the Arielle Rendilles lives along the great northern track.

- After the village visit depart for Kalacha.
- Experience a leisurely drive that will take you through a murrum terrain.
- Arrive at the lodge for lunch and leisure.
- At 1600hrs you will meet your guide and walk to a Gabra Village.



Gabra Tribe

The Gabra (Gabbra or Gebra) people are Oromo-speaking camel pastoralist ethnic group occupying the arid Chalbi lands of Northern Kenya and the highlands of Southern Ethiopia. They live in a 350,000 square kilometer area spread from the Marsabit District of Kenya to the Sidamo Province of Ethiopia. They are closely associated with other Oromo, especially their non-nomadic neighbors, the Borana.

The name “Gabra” may have roots in the Oromo word gabaro, meaning “vassal” and possibly indicating an association within the Borana federation.

The Gabra’s ornamentation and physical culture is similar to many other Cushitic-speaking camel herders. The Gabra live in an area surrounded by other ethnic groups, such as the Turkana (turkan), the Rendille (rendil and Somali, all of whom the Gabra describe as warra dassee (“people of the mat”), in reference to the mat-covered, portable tents, which accompany their nomadic lifestyle),

For the Gabra, to live in balance with a trying environment is to protect land, animal, and fellow Gabra. Thus, they practice certain food and plant taboos, preserve full-grown trees called “korma” (bulls), and revere pregnant women and pregnant animals. As resource managers, they migrate to the highlands during the rainy season to allow the dry season pasture to replenish its water resources.

- Return to the lodge leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Villa Resort – Low Budget Lodge (B/L/D)

Day 5

- Kalacha – Loiyangalani
- Distance : 200kms
- Drive Time : 5.5hrs
- Breakfast will be served at 0700hrs.
- At 0730hrs depart for Loiyngalani via the Chalbi Desert.
- Arrive at the lodge for lunch and leisure.
- A visit will be arranged to:

El Molo Tribe

The smallest tribe in Kenya that has over 5000 in population, they live by the lake side and their lifestyle is full of mystery.

The El Molo people fish for a living and they sell some of their fish in order to get other types of food. They tend to sell their fresh fish, and smoke the fish they will eat so that it will last a long time.

They also have their own version of fish oil that they give all the children so that they can be healthy and not get sick.



In the past the El Molo used to battle crocodiles from their tiny canoes and would eat crocodile meat. They also used to eat hippo meat after hunting the dangerous hippo and they used to have a reputation for bravery because of this. Due to anti-poaching laws they were forced to stop this. Now they survive on fish and what they can trade fish for. In olden times the hippo hunter was celebrated as a hero and they had some special earrings and a necklace to wear.

- Arrive at the lodge early evening for leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Palm Shade Camp – Budget Lodge (B/L/D)

Day 6

- Loiyangalani
- Breakfast will be served at 0800hrs.
- A transfer will be arranged to Lake Turkana to experience a boat safari and a visit will be arranged to the Southern or Central Island that is inhabited by Nile Crocodiles.
- On completion a transfer will be arranged back to the jetty.
- A transfer will be arranged to the lodge for lunch and leisure.
- An afternoon visit will be arranged to The Turkana people where the village elder will tell you more about their beliefs , Interests and livelihood.

Turkana Tribe

Traditional accessories include a small wooden stool carved out of a mangle piece of wood (used either as a pillow or a stool), a wooden stick with a distinctive shape, and a wrist knife. Both the men and the women wear with great flourish the lip plug through the lower lip. The women wear a variety of beaded and metal adornments, much of it indicating to the trained eye events in the woman's life. A half skirt of animal skins and a piece of block cloth are the only garments worn, although these days pieces of colourful cloth are not uncommon for use as baby slings.

Tattooing is also common and usually has special meaning. Men are tattooed on the shoulders and upper arm each time they kill an enemy — the right shoulder for killing a man, the left for a women; it's surprising the number of men you still see with these markings. Witch doctors and prophets are held in high regard and tattooing on someone's lower stomach is usually a sign of witch doctors' attempts to cast out an undesirable spirit rather than any sort of decoration.

- Arrive at the lodge late afternoon and spend time at leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Palm Shade Camp – Budget Lodge (B/L/D)



Day 7

- Loiyangalani – Maralal
- Distance : 250kms
- Drive Time : 5.5hrs
- Early breakfast will be served followed by a check out.
- Depart for Maralal.
- Experience a leisurely drive as you pass through a murram terrain.
- Arrive at the lodge for lunch.
- In the afternoon you will enjoy a half day camel safari as you visit forests and plains, watering holes, and meeting herders in the scenic landscape surrounding Maralal.
- Return to the lodge for leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Ngari Hill Lodge (B/L/D)

Day 8

- Maralal – Lake Baringo
- Distance : 200kms
- Drive Time : 4.5hrs
- Early breakfast will be served followed by a check out.
- A visit will be arranged to a Pokot Village.
- They speak Pökoot, language of the Southern Nilotic language family which is close to the Marakwet, Nandi, Tuken and other members of the Kalanjen grouping.
- Based on areal and cultural differences, the Pokot people can be divided into two groups (Rottland 1982): the Hill Pökot and the Plains Pokot
- The Hill Pokot live in the rainy highlands in the west and in the central south of the Pokot area and are both farmers and pastoralists. The Plains Pokot live in the dry and infertile plains, herding cows, goats and sheep.
- The homestead is the social center for the Pokoot. Here a man lives with his wives, each having their own hut.
- All members of the family live here and the stock is corralled here at night. The man of the family rules the homestead, telling the others what duties they are to perform.
- After the village tour depart for Lake Baringo.

(Lake Baringo is world renown for its birdlife as well as other wildlife including crocodiles, hippos, hyrax and now giraffes on the Ruko Island Conservancy. With the increase in the lake levels over the past few years, the lake has attracted large flocks of yellow billed storks, pink backed pelicans.

Experience a leisurely and scenic drive with a brief stopover at The View Point to marvel at the scenic beauty of The Great Rift Valley.



- Arrive at the lodge in time for lunch and leisure.
- Early afternoon experience a boat ride as you meet hippos getting into the lake from their overnight grazing, crocodiles sunbathing in the early sun rays, aquatic birds: the kingfishers hovering, the cormorants swimming, jacanas “walking on the water” , skimmers skimming the waters, herons in still position for the moment to spear their prey and what about the African Fish eagle that scans the waters to prey on fish swimming just below the surface.
- The boat ride leads to ‘Teddy Bear Island, Devils Island and Ol Kokwe Island some of the seven islands inhabited by the Njemps, a maa speaking community. Get a chance to meet them and learn about their culture.
- A transfer will be arranged to the lodge for check in and leisure.
- Dinner and Overnight at Soi Safari Lodge (B/L/D)

Day 9

- Lake Baringo – Nairobi
- Distance : 280kms
- Drive Time : 5hrs
- Early breakfast will be served followed by a check out.
- Depart for Nairobi.
- Enjoy a leisurely and scenic drive with a brief stopover at The View Point to marvel at the scenic beauty of The Great Rift Valley.
- Arrive in time for lunch at the Carnivore Restaurant to experience game meat and barbecue meat.
- A transfer will be arranged to JKI Airport to board your flight back home (B)
